Methow Conservancy Hires Program Assistant

May 27, 2005 -- The Methow Conservancy added Mary Kiesau to their staff last Monday (May 23) to fill a new Program Assistant position. Kiesau is a graduate of the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill.

"The Methow Valley's friendly people, community spirit, natural beauty and ecological diversity make it an amazingly special place, and I'm thrilled to have the opportunity to help protect it," said Kiesau.
